Sergeant's Help Ian B This week's speaker was Dr Joanne Bellette the principal of Corowa High School. Dr Bellette spoke about the critical state of finding staff to teach students in the NSW Education system. The NSW Department of Education has been trying to put into places different strategies in order to attract new teachers to the department. They are also looking at retaining teachers and other staff during this crisis. The current state of education in Australia, is seeing teachers resign or quit due to overwork and other work pressures. The Department of Education is trying to stop this by using new recruitment methods, such as, money incentives, paying for degrees and fast-tracking new graduates.

Over the past 2 years with the outbreak of COVID, the rigours of online learning and the tripling of paperwork being put on teachers, many staff have left, or new graduates are not even going into the profession. New initiatives are needed. More money, reduced face to face teaching and more training could be a solution.



Dr Bellette spoke about being unable to staff classes and having to have combined classes, which makes learning hard or near impossible. There are major shortages of Maths, Science, English and other teachers. She did say Visual Arts and TAS teachers were plentiful. (But if this were the case, there would not be a shortage of casual staff or teachers!)

The Education Department of NSW, and in Australia in general, are in desperate need of teachers and casual staff. Even older teachers are retiring and not returning to the classroom. Dr Bellette also mentioned hiring or getting teachers from overseas, but even then, it is difficult as teachers are in demand all over the world.

It was a very interesting talk by the CHS Principal who told the club there will be more announcements in the next few weeks and she hoped that with COVID settling down and things going back to normal teaching may return to normal as well.

Rotary Information –

The Guatemala Literacy Project has worked for 25 years to improve reading rates. In 1997, Joe and Jeff Berninger, brothers from Ohio, were volunteering as English teachers at a Guatemalan school that had no books. The two launched a project to solve that. The day the books arrived, there was a huge celebration, and a Rotarian dentist volunteering nearby heard the noise and asked what was going on. "He said this would be a perfect project for Rotary," says Joe Berninger, now a member of the Rotary Club of Pathways, Ohio, which coordinates the project. Rotarians in Guatemala helped develop reading programs in other schools and since 1997, The Rotary Foundation has helped fund the literacy program with 48 grants totalling \$6.5 million. Nearly 800 clubs in 90 districts have participated, making it one of the largest grassroots, multiclub, multidistrict projects in Rotary.
