



ROMAC is the acronym for “**Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children**” and is a combined Australian and New Zealand initiative. It was commenced out of the actions of a single Rotarian in March, 1988, when a member of the Rotary Club of Kangaroo Flat in Victoria, visited Lambasa in Fiji with a group of Australian surgeons. He found the child mortality rate as high as 25% in some places, and quickly established that a major factor was the lack of medical and surgical facilities and skills available to children of those areas. Rotary was challenged to assist an 18 year old Fijian girl whose right leg was threatened if immediate surgery was not performed. During the next four years eight children were brought to Australia by the Rotary Club of Kangaroo Flat for major, often life saving surgery. Soon 20 Rotary clubs were caught up in the success of each case and assisted in various ways.

ROMAC quickly went about harnessing assistance from medical experts, hospitals, nurses, physiotherapists, pathology and radiology services, airlines, sponsors and other supporters.

To date ROMAC has changed and saved the lives of over 400 children, enabling them and their families to live normal, happy lives. The desired objective of ROMAC always has been to try and help these “forgotten children” with life saving and life restoring procedures aimed at giving back their hope for the future to which all children are entitled. No child should be considered a “freak” thereby being hidden away or exploited and become psychologically secluded with absolutely no quality of life or self esteem. Children in developed countries receive this as a birth right. All children should receive the same entitlement.




